

Hartington Upper Quarter parish extends from moorland north of Earl Sterndale and Hollinsclough in the south, to Fernilee reservoir and the top of the Goyt Valley to the north. There are no settlements in the parish, which is characterised by scattered farms. However, the parish hall can be found at Brandside, which is just over a mile northeast of Flash.


The parish covers a number of different landscape characters within the south west peak including; open moors, moorland hills and ridges, densely enclosed gritstone uplands, upland pastures, limestone hills and slopes and upland pastures (Peak District National Park Landscape Strategy Action Plan 2009)






The parish of Hartington Upper Quarter has a population of 438 residents (2011 census).






Occupancy of Properties


Affordable Housing
