Adoption Statement August 2014

The Peak District National Park Authority formally adopted its Detailed Design Supplementary Planning Documents for Shop Fronts and for Alterations and Extensions on 11 July 2014. Annex 1 - Statement of Consultation

Since adopting its Design Guide in 2007, the Authority has looked to produce design guide supplements to add detail on particular types of development. The production of these documents was postponed until after the Core Strategy was completed and more latterly until the Supplementary Planning Document for Climate Change and Sustainable Building had been completed and adopted in March 2013. Since that time the Authority's Historic Buildings Architect has completed the drafting

process and documents were subsequently brought to the Planning Committee for approval in December 2013.

The detailed design guide notes have now been consulted on in accordance with the SCI process as described on page 16 of the Authority's adopted SCI dated May 2012. The consultation period ran for 8 weeks up to 28 April, but later representations were accepted. 15 responses were received from a wide range of organisations from statutory consultees such as Natural England and the Environment Agency to architects, local heritage societies and Parish Councils.

In line with the Authority's commitment to give local people an opportunity to shape the development plan and supplementary planning documents, every parish council was written to and made aware that these document were available for consultation. In line with the Authority's commitment to give parish councils sufficient time to respond, the Authority's consultation period was 8 weeks and, where late responses from any quarter were submitted, they were all considered. The overwhelming response from the consultation was that both documents are well prepared, useful and informative. Where suggestions for change were made, they were predominantly to strengthen or clarify messages rather than to change messages.

The Alterations and Extensions document received most of the responses. Issues ranged from detailed opinions on specific design points to more general points about structure, layout, tone of the document, and the extent to which illustrations and photographs should be used alongside text. In some cases consultees offered examples, which have been integrated into the documents. In other cases, suggestions to include many more illustrations have been rejected in order to retain a consistency of style with other currently adopted design documents. This has not prevented the

inclusion of illustrations to demonstrate particular issues e.g. in relation to properties overlooking each other and minimum separation distances. In some cases the text has been amended to give potential for creative 'architect-led' schemes, but the document retains text and messages that for the vast majority of applicants and agents are worthy of re-enforcement. It was suggested that a glossary be included, but it is proposed to include a glossary alongside rather than integral to the documents. This retains the consistency with the Authority's other design guides (which do not offer a glossary), but will offer useful information to the 'lay reader'. It was also suggested that list of further reading be included, and this has now been done.

The Shop Fronts document brought fewer responses. Nevertheless there were some changes made to recognise the need for consistency of tone with text in a leaflet prepared with Bakewell Town Council on public realm issues (in particular the proliferation of 'A' boards on pavements). Other changes include a better annotated illustration of a shop front including the various architectural terms used in the document.
