When looking at local needs developments, you need to ensure that these will be properly affordable, in sustainable locations (not in flood prone areas), and that they exceed building regulations with regards to sustainability and accessibility. Scale is also impor with other developments: you mention campsites in open countryside, but not about how big they are, and there are several new campsites which may be 'basic' but are so big they're creating a big impact. There also needs to be more planning of countryside land use: the fields here almost all growing ryegrass for silage, which is catastrophic for ground-nesting birds and useless for biodiversity.
