Thorpe settlement is located between Fenny Bentley to the east and Ilam to the west. Thorpe is regarded as the 'gateway' to Dove Dale, a valley along the River Dove, owned and managed by the National Trust and a tourist attraction for walkers.

The settlement is lose-knit in layout with groups of buildings and open green spaces in-between. The Conservation Area was designated in 1997 and has an accompanying Conservation Area Appraisal.

Thorpe is located within the 'village farmlands on shale ridges' landscape type of the Derbyshire Peak Fringe character area (LSAP 2009).





The village is dominated by the conical hill of Thorpe Cloud which guards the entrance to Dovedale. "Thorpe" means farm in Scandinavian languages. Danish settlers did not generally penetrate far into the Peak District, apart from a few farmers bringing sheep to graze on the lush grass. Vikings started settling in the area around 800 AD.

The village was mentioned in the Doomsday Book in 1086 as land belonging to the King.

The village clusters around the beautiful St Leonards Church with its Norman tower built about 1100 AD. The church building is open during the hours of daylight. The south porch of St Leonards Church has some interesting grooves in either side of the doorway – these are arrow sharpening marks. A sundial tops a pedestal in the churchyard and as it is too high to be read by pedestrians, it is safe to assume it was designed for horse riders.


The Dovedale Dash is organised annually (the first Sunday in November) by the Thorpe villagers. It is a cross country race of 4³/₄ miles run by up to 1,500 people of all abilities. One of the excitements is the crossing of the River Dove at the well-known stepping stones. Any surplus from the proceeds of the race go to local charitable causes and the upkeep of Thorpe village hall.


Population and Demographics




