Volunteer responsibilities & activities	 To be an ambassador for the Peak District National Park To undertake appropriate training for the role. Be receptive to keeping up to date with current issues, news and briefings and policies relevant to the role. Undertaking volunteer activities to a high level of health and safety, adhering to safeguarding guidelines, and that are in line with policies and risk assessments of the Authority. Ensures authority equipment and assets are used in a responsible and safe manner. Follow appropriate reporting methods.
	Responsibilities specific to the role: o Providing a courteous and positive experience of the Peak District National Park to members of the public, partners and stakeholders. o Supporting the work of the Ranger and Access team. Increasing public understanding of protected areas.

Reimbursement of expenses	At the discretion of the team manager, volunteers can claim their travel expenses for travel between home and the place volunteering. Reimbursement are recognised by HM Revenue & Customs (HMRC) and as legitimate expenses for volunteers and must only be actual costs incurred and be at a 'reasonable' rate (e.g. mileage rates within HMRC limits); they incur no tax liability.
	 Mileage costs @ 45p per mile cars (24p/mile motorbikes, 20p/mile pedal cycles) up to a maximum of £15 per journey. Bus and train tickets up to a maximum of £15 will be reimbursed only upon receipt of ticket/proof of purchase.
